I. Geneology

Hayes Lineage

Great-great-great Grandfather: Richard Hayes, Ilmiston, Pembrokeshire, Wales

- Society of Friends
- Emigrated to Haverford Township 1687
- Wife: Issatt
- Children: Richard and John
- Purchased 50 acres in Haverford from Arthur Buse before immigrating
- Purchased 50 acres adjoining Haverford land from William Howell in 1696
- DOD 8/4/1697; buried in Haverford Friends Cemetery

Great-great Grandfather: Richard Hayes, II (DOD bet. 11/23/1738 & 3/3/1739)

- Wife: Elizabeth Lewis: DOM 3/4/1697 (DOB 12/14/1677; DOD 3/26/1742)
 - Daughter of Henry (DOD 6/17/1688) and Margaret Lewis
 - Emigrated with parents and siblings (Henry and Samuel) from Narberth, Pembrockshire, Wales, to The Grange in Haverford
- Children: Joseph, Mary, Hannah, Benjamin, Richard, Isaac
- Strict adherent to Friends
- Described as with much energy of character and well educated
- Provincial Assembly: 1704; 1706-09; 1713, 1717-18, 1726-29; 1737
- Justice of the Peace and Judge of the Courts of Chester County
- Commissioner of the Loan Office
- 1707, erected Haverford New Mill (a/k/a Leedom's Mill) with Abraham Lewis and David Morris
- managed flour mill and accompanying store; some flour and meal exported to the west Indies

Great Grandfather: Benjamin Hayes (DOB 9/27/1710; DOD 1/24/1764))

- Wife: Mary Jones (DOD 1792)
 - o DOM 10/21/1737
 - Daughter of Jonathan Jones (DOB 1679; DOD 6/30/1770), who was the son of Edward (physician and surgeon/chirurgeon) and Mary Jones, both of Wales, and Gainer Owen, both of Merion (DOM 8/4/1706)

- Child: Elizabeth (DOB 7/16/1738; DOD 9/3/1767))
- Described as well educated, but not as energetic his father, Richard II
- Clerk to the Commissioner of Chester County

Grandmother Hayes: Elizabeth (DOB 7/18/1738; DOD 9/3/1767)

- Married George Smith (Grandfather); DOM 6/8/1764
- Children:
 - o **Benjamin** Hayes Smith (Father) (DOB 8/11/1765)
 - father of Dr. George
 - o Mary (DOB 10/20/1766; DOD 1821)
 - Married Samuel Davis (DOD 1851 or 52), a Phila. hatter
 - Children: Esther, Elizabeth, Samuel and George
 - Disowned by Friends (probably due to marriage)
- Husband moved into Haverford mansion, but they moved to Phila. with son, Benjamin, and mother, Mary, in 1766
- Upon her death, Elizabeth's husband George married Elizabeth Roberts of Phila. (DOD 12/1813)

Father: Benjamin Hayes Smith (DOB 8/11/1765; DOD 4/24/1806)

- Married Mary Johnson; DOM 1/29/1795
 - Daughter of Samuel Johnson and Mary Dunn (sister of George Dunn)
 - o Died without children
 - o First cousin of Margaret Dunn
- Married Margaret, a/k/a Margaretta, Dunn (DOM 1801)
 - daughter of George Dunn, (DOB 1743; DOD 5/21/1805), brother of Mary Dunn, and Mary Curry
 - lieutenant in Continental Army
 - First cousin of first wife, Mary Johnson
- Children:
 - Elizabeth Hayes Smith (DOB 5/22/1802)
 - Married Dr. Isaaac Anderson
 - o **George** (DOB 2/12/1804)
- took oath of allegiance and fidelity per Assembly of Pa 9/26/1786
- during minority, resided with aristocratic family of William Hamilton at the Woodlands
- "Disowned" by Friends on charges of "dress and address"
- private secretary of William Hamilton until 4/6/1793 (age 28)
- fine scholar; thoroughly educated; beautiful chirography
- conveyancer, not farmer
- PA legislator (rep. Delaware County) 1801-04

- Justice of the Peace 1804- DOD (appt. by Gov. McKean)
- Died from wound received from a "vicious" boy at his father's (George Smith's) school (one of the best in Phila.), where he was an assistant teacher

- Moved from Haverford to Philadelphia with wife, Elizabeth, and son, Benjamin (and mother-in-law, Mary) 12/1766
- Father of **Benjamin** and Mary (above)
- Re-married Elizabeth Roberts (DOD 12/1813)
 - Son, George Smith (DOD 1810) unmarried
- School teacher

- Only child of Abraham Lewis (DOD 12/3/1825) and Rebecca Lawrence (DOD 10/26/1829)
- Lived at the Collen Brook Farm, Upper Darby (800 acres)
- DOM; Feb. 26, 1829
- POM; Philadelphia
- Presider; Mayor George Dallas
- Mary inherits farm when mother dies in Oct. 26, 1829

 - o Swarthmore College, Prof. of Greek and German (1869-70)
 - o Harvard College,
 - Tutor of Latin (1870-73)
 - Asst. Prof. of Latin (1873-83)
 - Professor of Latin (1883-1901)
 - Pope Prof. of Latin (1901-1904)

PA State Senator (1832-36)

- District of Delaware and Chester County (divided Sept. 26,1789)
- Chair, Education Committee 1834-36
 - Wrote 1st public school law for PA
 - First law, Act of April 1, 1834
 - Rescinded Pauper Act of 1809
 - Much opposition from landed class and religious schools
 - Not mandatory could refuse to impose tax, but lose state subsidy (17 of 22 Del. Co. districts approve)
 - Supported by Governor Wolf and Thadeus Stevens (later famous anti-slave Congressman)
 - Act of June 13, 1836, crafted by chairman George, strengthened opt out

- First practical and efficient general education act in PA
- Consolidated and amended several education acts, including the Act of April 1, 1834
- Clearly set forth powers and duties of directors and salaries of faculty
- Districts had option to reinstate Pauper Act of 1809
- Much more popular with school districts
- Act of May 8, 1854 replaced 1836 → mandatory public education (opt out prohibited)
- 1854, 1st Superintendent, Common Schools of Dela. Co.
- Pres., Upper Darby School Board, 25 years (1854-79)
- Resigned Dec 8, 1836
- Associate Judge of CCP, Delco (lay judge)
 - o Gov. Joseph Ritner appointed him
 - Served until 1842 (Chester); elected for 5 years from 1861-66 (Media)
 - o Bought house at 410 State Street (Brook Row built 1855)

 - Professor Joseph Leihy, paleontologist (past geology and fossils)
- Elected 1st president May 1834

- Missed only 40 monthly meetings between 1834 and 1882 (Sat AM)
- Incorporated: Feb. 8, 1836
- 1st home 1837, Rose Tree Road Hall
 - o collect and display specimens of natural history of county
 - o Dr. Smith's herbarium (dried plants) collection
 - o Underground Railroad station rumor is true
- Moved to Veterans Square, Media, Feb. 1868
- Interests: botany, mineralogy, geology

Writings commissioned by DCIS

- 1835: An Essay Demonstrating the Fitness of the Stone Quarried at Leiper's Quarry, in Del. Co., for Use in Erecting the Delaware Breakwater
 - o Leiper's stone was actually superior to that quarried elsewhere
 - o Restored Leiper as supplier
- 1843: An Account of the Great Rainstorm & Flood of August 5, 1843
 - O Started 7 A.M.; tropical hurricane-type rain by early P.M.
 - o Tornado like winds; visibility 50 feet
 - o Major flooding by 6 P.M. on Chester, Ridley, Crum and Darby
 - o 23 ft water rise in Chester in 1 hour
 - o 19 dead; 32 bridges, 8 factories, 5 mills destroyed
- 1862: History of Delaware County, Pennsylvania
 - Octavo: sheet folded into 8 leaves, 6 x 91/2 inches
 - o 581 pages
 - o 76 pages of biographical notices in dictionary form
 - o picked up from Joseph Edwards, Esq. (re-written)
 - discovery to Penn's government
- Letters to newspapers written 1845-49 supporting removal of county seat from Chester to Media
